

Background, Mission, and Admission

Established in 1991, Maggie L. Walker Governor's School is a unique public school for gifted and high achieving students that serves fourteen school divisions in the Richmond area. MLWGS offers a rigorous and accelerated college preparatory program emphasizing a variety of academic areas and is accredited by the Virginia Department of Education.

Our mission is to provide comprehensive educational opportunities that advance gifted students' understanding of world cultures and languages. Our diverse and supportive community develops students' character and ability to contribute, collaborate, and lead.

Our school celebrates the legacy of its namesake, Maggie Lena Walker, the first female African American bank president. As a social activist, Ms. Walker believed in the power of education, and she fought for equality for all. Inspired by her humanitarianism, Maggie Walker Governor's School operates under the four pillars of Courage, Compassion, Community, and Collaboration, which we call the "Walker Way."





All courses at Maggie Walker are taught at the Honors level with options in specific subject areas for accelerated ("Plus" level) courses, Advanced Placement courses, Dual Enrollment courses through Virginia Commonwealth University, and upper level "Intensive" courses.

Selection for admission to MLWGS is a highly competitive process coordinated by a regional planning team. Over 1100 eighth graders competed for approximately 200 seats in this year's entering ninth grade class. An application process includes on-site standardized testing and writing samples. Maggie Walker Governor's School strives to maintain an inclusive school environment and is committed to recruiting and retaining students, faculty, and staff who are highly able, who value our international mission, and who represent the diversity of the world we share.

Partnership with Virginia Commonwealth University

Dual Enrollment courses are taught through a unique partnership with Virginia Commonwealth University, a four-year public research university that offers MLWGS students rigorous higher-level courses

and one-on-one mentorship opportunities. Courses are taught on the MLWGS campus by MLWGS teachers who have affiliate faculty status at VCU. Grades for these university courses are included on both the MLWGS and VCU transcripts, and they receive extra weight in the calculation of the MLWGS grade point average.



Calculation of GPA

GPA is calculated on a 4.0 scale. Advanced Placement, Dual Enrollment, University and Intensive Courses have an additional weighting of 1.0 in the calculation of quality points. Maggie Walker offers an "all-Honors" curriculum, including four "Plus" level (accelerated) courses and two Pre-AP courses, where no additional weight is added. Middle school courses are not factored into GPA.

Senior Seminar & Mentorship

As a requirement for graduation, all seniors must participate in (1) a seminar at MLWGS (small group research study), or (2) a mentorship field experience off campus (minimum of 115 hours with a mentor in the professional community and 25 hours with mentorship coordinator). Both the seminar and mentorship students must complete a significant research project and present their findings to a student audience on Senior Showcase Day.

Athletics & Extra-Curricular Activities

MLWGS offers twenty-eight athletic teams that participate in the 3B Region of the Virginia High School League and have earned the VHSL champion's cup for this division. Over 60 clubs and activities serve the diverse interests of the student body.

Class Rank

MLWGS 101 & Dragon Advisory

In an effort to create a level academic playing field and foster a sense of belongingness among students from 14 different school divisions, all Maggie Walker Governor School freshmen participate in two transition-focused programs: MLWGS 101 and Dragon Advisory.

MLWGS 101 (formerly Foundations: Fundamentals of Independent Research/Communication) is a credit-based course that focuses on quarterly topics, beginning with technology basics, study skills, and elements of honor. Foundational skills are followed by 10-week graded rotations in speech, statistics, and social studies research/paper-writing. The final grade in Foundations/MLWG\$ 101 is an average of the graded rotations. Note: For the Classes of 2026 and 2027, Foundations also included a graded science rotation that is now covered in the Biology curriculum.

Dragon Advisory provides freshmen with a cohort of peers (the same groups as MLWGS 101), a designated faculty advisor, and an upperclass student mentor to assist with the transition from middle school to the culture of the Walker Way. In 30-minute lunchtime sessions several times a month, Advisory meets to give students a chance to ask questions of their mentors, to build relationships with their fellow freshmen, and to acclimate to their new school in a warm and supportive environment. Dragon Advisory is an ungraded course. Approximately 80 members of the Class of 2026 have served as Dragon Mentors (formerly "Bonsai Mentors"), several as program leaders, earning 40 hours of school-related service.

Course Offerings 2025-2026

All courses at Maggie Walker Governor's School have been designed for the gifted student and, as such, provide more rigor and challenge than similar courses at other schools. In addition to the courses listed below, students may also propose, while meeting certain specific guidelines, a Student Generated Curriculum (SGC) on a topic of their choosing. If a student has exhausted all subject area course offerings, that student may apply to take courses at universities which may be reflected on their transcript.

All Intensive level courses will include a discipline-appropriate culminating assessment (e.g. research paper, presentation, portfolio, exam, or other capstone project) from which no student may be exempt.
